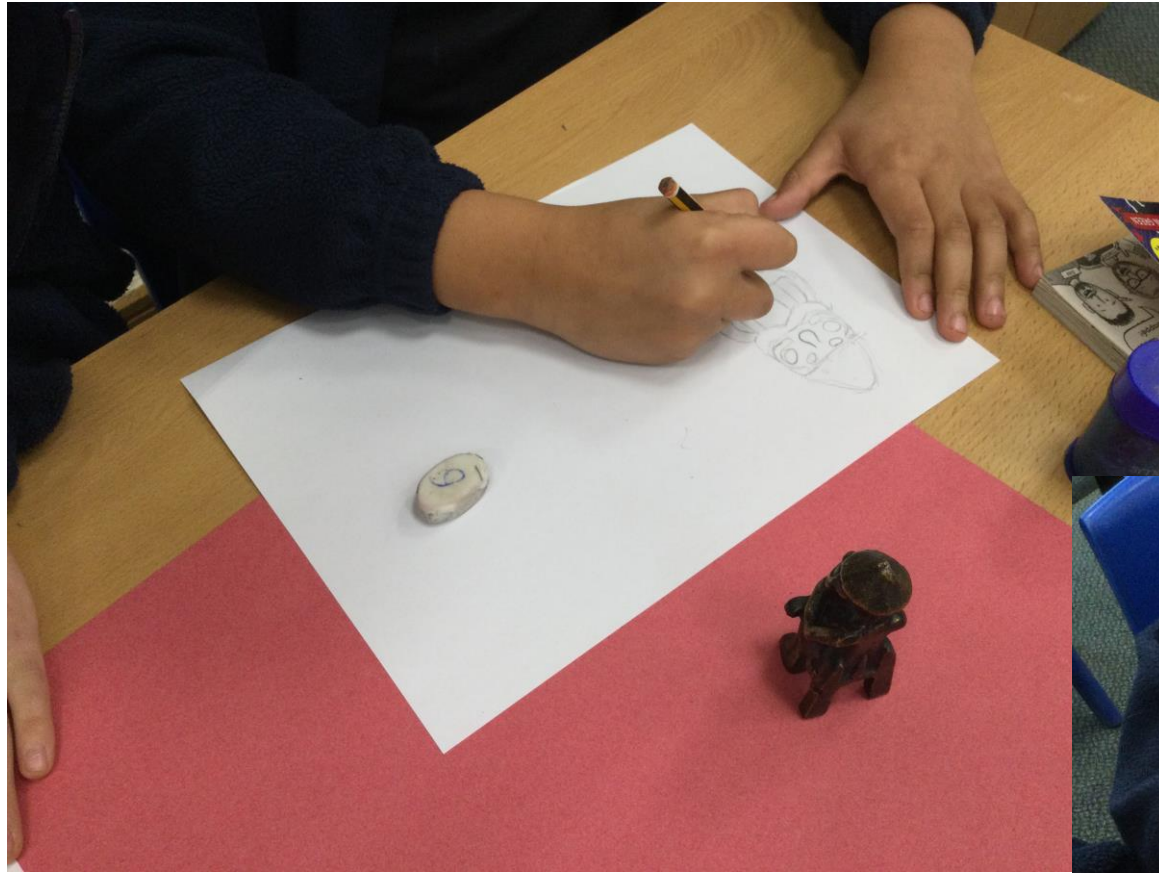


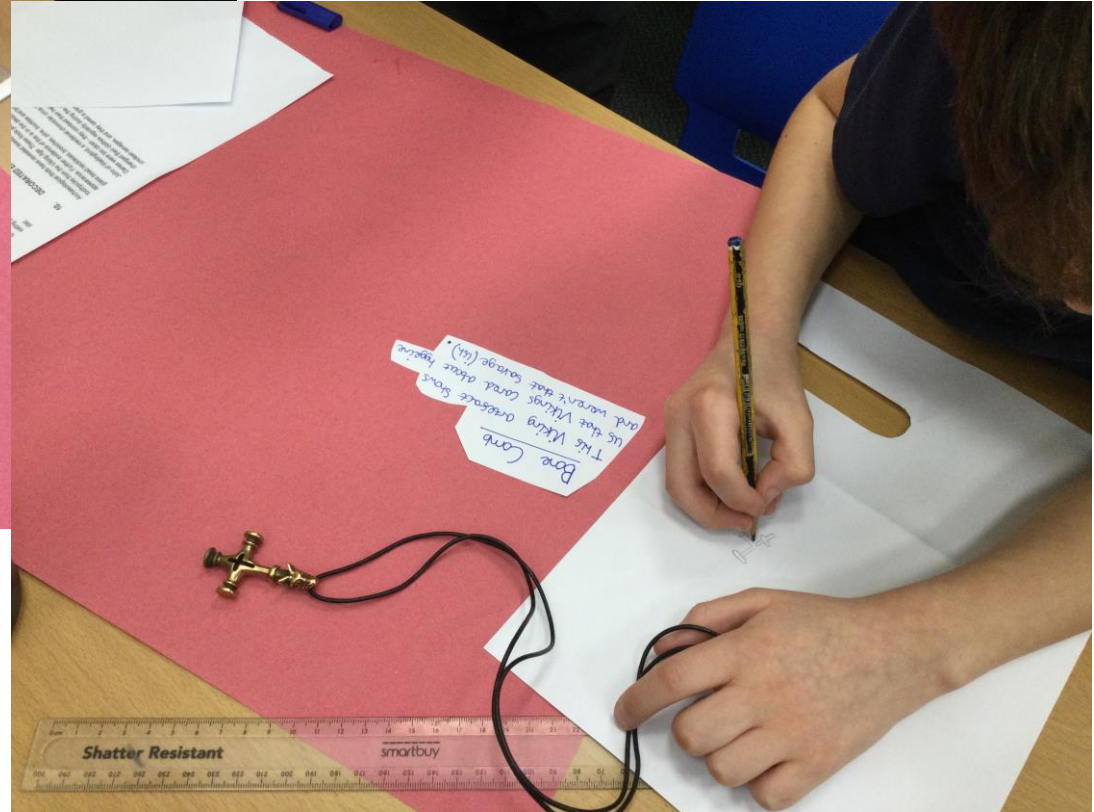


Viking Belongings

In history, we looked at replica objects from the museum service. We guessed what the objects were, looked at them closely and found out facts about them.



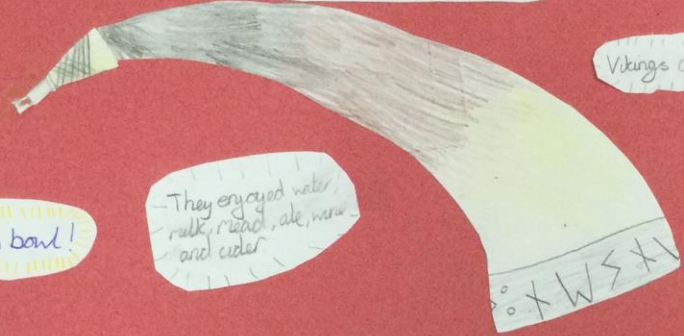




Drinking horn!



Vikings drank from animal horns



Vikings traditionally ate their food from a flat wooden board or bowl

They enjoyed water, milk, mead, ale, honey and cider



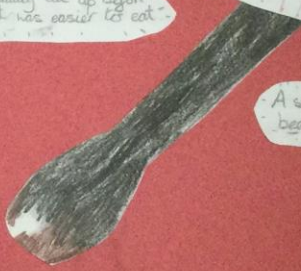
They also used vessels made of horn and carvings

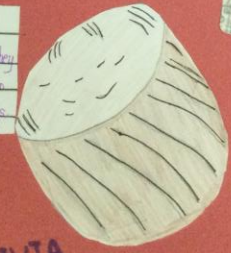
VIKING ARTEFACTS

This iron bell has an iron clanger and loop. It was used for cattle sheep/pets to make easier to locate.



Archaeological finds have revealed tweezers, combs, nail cleaners, ear cleaners and toothpicks from the Viking age. These finds prove that the Vikings cared greatly about their appearance.

Vikings traditionally ate their food from a flat wooden board or bowl but they also used vessels. They would have been light weight, good for travelling Vikings.

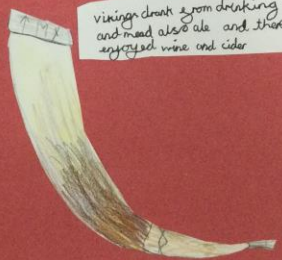
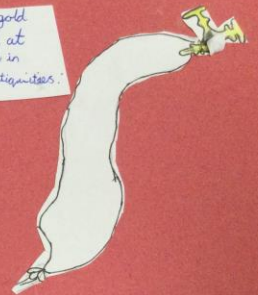


The Eyrland statue is a bronze statue of a figure from about 1000 AD that was recovered at the Eyrland farm in the area of Akureyri.



this is a replica of a 9th century original found in Zealand. Horn inlays on leather side of a woman's chest near shoulder level.

Vikings drank from drinking horns - both water, milk and mead also ale and there is evidence they enjoyed wine and cider.
