Easter Recipes

How to make ... Easter Egg Nests

Ingredients

115g/8oz of plain chocolate broken into pieces 1tbsp of golden syrup 50g/2oz of butter

water

12-hole fairy cake tin bowl hob pan 45q/3oz cornflakes fridge 36 mini chocolate eggs



12 paper bun cases

Equipment



What you do...

- 1. Line the fairy cake tin with the 12 paper bun cases.
- 2. Put some water into the pan and let it gently simmer.
- 3. Put the chocolate, golden syrup and butter in a bowl.
- 4. Put the bowl on top of the pan, but don't let it touch the water. Stir the mixture as it heats until it is smooth.
- 5. Remove the bowl from the heat and gently stir in the cornflakes. Keep stirring until the cornflakes are completely covered in chocolate.
- 6. Divide the mixture between the paper cases and press 3 chocolate eggs into the centre of each nest.
- Chill the buns in the fridge for 1 hour or until they are completely set.

How to make **Hot Cross Cookies**

Ingredients

200g of softened butter, plus extra for the trays 100g of light muscovado sugar 250g of plain flour 1 tsp of cinnamon 2 tsp of baking powder

100g of sultanas 200g of white chocolate chips

Equipment Oven

Two baking trays Large mixing bowl Sieve

Wooden Spoon Small bowl (for

chocolate melting) Microwave

> Piping bag (or teaspoon) Cooling rack



You could either give these away as Easter gifts or you can eat them yourself with a warm glass of milk!

What you do...

- 1. Turn on the oven at 180°C or gas mark 4. Lightly butter the baking trays.
- 2. In the large bowl, beat the butter, sugar and egg until it is smooth.
- 3. Sift the flour, cinnamon and baking powder into the bowl and then combine to make a dough. After doing this, add the sultanas and 100g of the white chocolate chips. Mix everything
- 4. Roll lumps of dough into balls roughly the same size as golf balls. Flatten these onto the trays.
- 5. Bake in the oven for 10 minutes until they look golden and yummy.
- 6. When baked, remove the cookies from the tray and place them on a cooling rack. While they're cooling, get the remaining white chocolate and melt it in the microwave on low in 20 second bursts.
- 7. Using a small piping bag or a teaspoon, carefully driffle a cross on top of each cookie. Leave the icing to set before eating.

Easter Cards

Make an Faster Chick Card

How about making this cute, Easter chick card? It's so simple and quick to make. Follow our instructions and see how easy it is.

You will need:

- · A4 green card
- · A5 yellow card or paper
- · Pink card
- · Orange paper for beak
- · Black felt tip pen
- Mug to draw around
- Pencil
- Glue
- Scissors


What you do:

Draw a circle on one end of your yellow card by drawing round a mug with a pencil. You may find it easier if you turn your mug upside down. Cut carefully round the circle. This will be your chick's body.



Draw another circle the same size in the same way on pink card for the egg shell. Fold this circle exactly in half and cut along the fold. Starting at the top corner of the shell cut some zig-zag cuts into the egg shell to look like a broken shell. Be careful to end your zigzag cuts start and finish at the other top corners. You may prefer to lightly draw light guide lines before you begin cutting.




Fold the rest of the yellow paper into two and draw a wing shape. Cut through both layers together to give you two wings the same size and shape. Remember to make the wing a bit longer than can be seen in the finished chick because it needs to be stuck behind the body. Draw the feathers smaller than the wings but you will only need to cut one out.




Write your Easter greeting either near the top or bottom of your Easter card. Spread glue on the back of your chick and glue it in place being careful not to cover your writing. Let the chick dry in place before writing inside your card.



Make sure you turn the egg shell and chick body over so the pencil lines cannot be seen and glue the shell onto the body taking care to match the edges so the chick fits into the shell.



5 Carefully glue the wings and feathers to the back of the body. The wings should go at the sides just above the shell and feathers in the centre at the top.



Draw two eyes on the chick with a black felt tip pen. Cut out an orange beak and stick it on your chick.

Learn to tie your shoe laces

How to Tie Shoelaces with the Bunny Ears Method:

- Step 1. Take one shoelace in each hand.
- Step 2. Criss-cross the laces halfway up, by putting the black lace over the blue lace.
- Step 3. Poke the end of the black lace through the bunny hole, by putting it over the blue lace.
- Step 4. Hold the end of each lace, and pull tight.
- Step 5. Make a bunny ear by making a small loop with the black lace. The bunny ear needs a long tail.
- Step 6. Now make a bunny ear with the blue lace. It needs a long tail, too.
- Step 7. Cross the bunny ears, by putting the black loop over the middle of the blue loop.
- Step 8. Poke the blue bunny ear into the bunny hole, by crossing over the black loop.
- Step 9. Keep your fingers inside the bunny ears, then hold tight and pull.

Paper Mache Easter Egg

MATERIALS

- Balloons
- Bowl, covered in plastic wrap
- Newspaper, cut or torn into strips
- Flour
- White glue or PVA (optional)
- Paint
- Collage item decorations, such as rainbow feathers, tissue paper, and glitter (optional)



1. Prepare supplies

- Blow up a balloon and place in the plastic wrap-covered bowl.
- Tear or cut newspaper into small strips.
- To make the paper mache paste, whisk 1 part flour to 2 parts water. Stir in some white glue if you like.

2. Apply paper strips to balloon

- Dip each newspaper strip in the paste, then smooth onto the surface of the balloon.
- Continue adding paste-covered strips of newspaper until the balloon is completely covered with at least two layers of newspaper.

3. Let it dry completely (this can take up 2-3 days).

4. Paint and decorate your egg

Add feathers and glitter if you wish \odot
